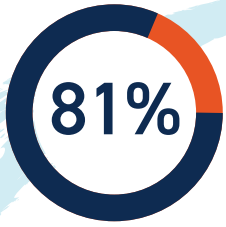
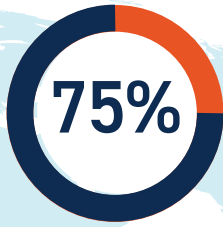

are interested in working in another country

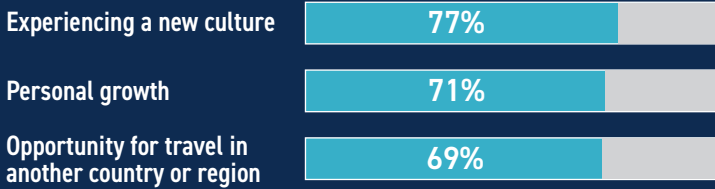


are more likely to accept a job offer with a company with work-abroad options

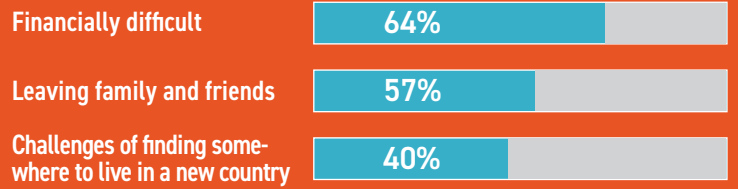
